The International Studies Major

The International Studies major focuses on the political, economic, social, and cultural forces that shape relations among states and peoples at the transnational level. The major is inherently interdisciplinary. Students majoring in International Studies should expect to complete coursework in some combination of Anthropology, Economics, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Religious Studies, and Sociology, as well as demonstrating competence in a foreign language. Students pursuing an International Studies major are challenged to develop critical thinking and writing skills, to master an additional language,

and to engage important questions of our day from the perspectives of multiple disciplines.

Major Requirements

The International Studies major is a 12 course major composed of 3 elements: a core set of 4 introductory courses, a thematic focus, and a regional focus including the study of a language related to the region.
